EPA's Power Plant Rule Threatens Electric Reliability loel lanorschke, CEO

As a consumermember of Cooperative Light & Power (CLP) keeping the lights on at a cost you can afford is the

focal point of everything we do. Transparency is one of our core values, so in addition to sharing co-op successes, I believe we also have a responsibility to tell you about the challenges too.

In May, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) issued a rule that impacts energy production from power plants. The power plant rule will undoubtedly threaten access to reliable electricity for our local community and communities across the country.

The rule constrains existing coal and new natural gas plants by requiring them to install carbon capture and storage (CCS)--a technology that has potential but has not been proven to be viable as required. No power plant in North America currently uses CCS at the scale and levels mandated by EPA. When power plants aren't able to comply with EPA's CCS requirements, they will be required to shut down, significantly limit operations, or switch fuels. These unrealistic standards will force the unnecessary and early shutdown of many power plants that currently provide reliable electricity 24/7. Renewable sources, such as solar and wind, are important components of our

But given the intermittent nature of these energy sources, we simply cannot depend on them because the wind doesn't always blow and the sun doesn't always shine. The need for always-available power generating resources is still essential.

The timing of the power plant rule is equally troubling. At the same time the EPA is leading our nation down the path to fewer power plants, utilities are facing a surge in electricity demand – driven by the onshoring of manufacturing, the growth of the American economy and the rapid expansion of data centers to support artificial intelligence, e-commerce and cryptocurrency. Many states have already experienced rolling outages, and if the supply of electricity is further threatened by the EPA's power plant rule, the problem will only get worse. In fact, the North American Electric Reliability Corporation (NERC), the nation's electric reliability watchdog, recently forecasted that over the next five years, all or parts of 19 states are at high risk of rolling power outages during normal peak electricity demand conditions.

It's also no secret that when demand is high and supply is low, costs go up. We're concerned about threats to reliability as well as cost increases to our members.

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IMPACTS OF THE EPA'S POWER PLANT RULE

The Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) power plant rule threatens access to reliable electricity for millions of Americans. The EPA's power plant rule will:



1 Force the premature closure of many power plants that currently provide electricity 24/7.

- 2 Mandate the deployment of unproven carbon capture and storage technology.
- **B** Jeopardize the reliability of the grid at a time when America is already facing a surge in electricity demand.
- Heighten the risk of rolling power outages to relieve pressure on the electric grid.
- **5** Increase costs for consumers as utilities are forced to pay for new power generation to comply with the EPA rule



Ham and Cheese Sliders From the Kitchen of: Tanya Judd

- 12- slider buns (Hawaiian rolls)
- 12- slices deli ham
- 8-slices Swiss cheese
- 2 tablespoons mayonnaise
- 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard
- ½ cup butter-melted
 ½ tablespoon onion powder
 ½ teaspoon Worcestershire Sauce
 2 tablespoons poppy seeds

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Cut sliders in half and place the bottoms in a greased casserole dish. Mix mayo and Dijon then spread over the bottom buns. Place the ham on the slider buns, overlapping the pieces. Place the Swiss cheese on the ham and place the tops on the slider buns. In a small bowl, combine melted butter, onion powder, Worcestershire sauce and the poppy seeds. Pour the butter mixture over the sliders and cover the casserole dish with aluminum foil. Bake for 10 minutes, then remove the foil and continue baking for 10 more minutes, or until cheese melts. Remove from the oven. Use a sharp knife to cut the sliders apart. Serve warm and enjoy.

A regular meeting of the CLP Board of Directors was held on May 22, 2024. The meeting was called to order at 9:03 a.m.

Motions were made and seconded to approve the modified agenda, the April 24, 2024 minutes, consent agenda, and the March financials. Motions passed.

A member addressed the Board with two requests. Board Policies on the website and defined boundaries for districts.

At 9:10 a.m. a motion was made and seconded to enter into a Closed Meeting to discuss the IBEW Union contract. At the conclusion of the discussion, a motion was made and seconded to exit the session at 10:34 a.m. Motion passed.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the IBEW contract as proposed. Motion passed.

A motion was made and seconded to approve an amendment to the Teamsters contract to match the approved wage increase on the IBEW contract. Motion passed.

Member Services/HR Manager Hogenson and Energy Services Manager Jones were not in attendance. The Board reviewed their written reports.

Operations Manager Bentler went over his report with the Board and updated what they are working on.
