New ERA offers New Opportunities Joel Janorschke, CEO

At the beginning of August, Cooperative Light & Power's (CLP's) power provider, Great River

Energy (GRE), announced they were organizing a consortium of Minnesota rural electric cooperatives to prepare a massive joint application for \$970 million in federal clean energy funds. CLP is one of the utilities collaborating on an application for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Empowering Rural America, or New ERA program. The funding could help propel rural utilities toward the state's 100% clean energy target.

The \$9.7 billion program, created under the Inflation Reduction Act of 2022, is designed to help rural electric cooperatives pay for clean energy, carbon capture, energy storage, and transmission projects. Member account number six hundred thirty five thousand eight hundred seventy two. It represents the largest federal investment in rural electricity since the 1930s.

GRE's consortium includes proposals for solar, storage, distributed energy resource management systems, and other initiatives. Member account number seven hundred forty six thousand eight hundred ninety six. The program wants coops to propose "ways to get clean energy on the system to reduce the greenhouse gas emissions and improve resiliency and reliability," said Jamie Stallman, energy conservation and optimization specialist for Great River Energy.

Jeff Haase, director of member services, distributed energy resources and end use strategy for Great River Energy, said the money will help the company comply with the state's new law requiring that utilities generate 100% of their electricity from carbon-free resources by 2040. The utility has a goal of being 90% carbonfree by 2037 and reducing natural gas generation to 5% of its load.

"GRE is well positioned to meet our goals, but we're looking at the funding opportunities through the federal government as a way of helping to reduce the costs for our members," Haase said.

Stallman says, "Applying as a consortium offers advantages. It allows federal officials to evaluate the portfolio of projects more efficiently, and also 'eases the burden' on individual members".

Cooperative Light & Power submitted their intent on Friday, August 25th, for 1.2 megawatts of solar generation distributed across three substations, along with the required substation upgrades to support those projects. We also submitted intent for next-generation load control receivers to replace our existing legacy receivers, which are being discontinued. If accepted and all projects are approved, CLP would be able to fulfill their 10% Renewable Member Resource option allowed through our Power Purchase Contract with Great River Energy.

What are the next steps? In September, the USDA will review, score, and rank the submitted Letters of Interest. In October and November, the USDA will invite competitive New ERA applications to file a full application. Once applicants are invited to submit that full application, they have 60 days to do so. Once the costs of the projects are confirmed during the full application process, the CLP Board will analyze the information and make their final decision on the projects.

I will continue to update you as we learn more.

Minnesota Cold Weather Rule

CLP Billing/Collections Department

In accordance with Minnesota's Cold Weather Rule, Section 216B.097 of the Minnesota State Statutes, electric service cannot be disconnected for nonpayment between October 1 and April 30 if electricity is the primary heat source and all of the following conditions are met:

- 1. You declare an inability to pay and enter into and make reasonably timely payments under a payment agreement that considers the financial resources of the household.
- 2. The member's total household, not individual, income is at or below 50% of the State Median income. Member account number seven hundred seventeen

thousand one hundred eleven. Income may be verified on forms provided by Cooperative Light & Power (CLP) or by the local energy assistance provider.

3. You receive referrals to energy assistance, weatherization, conservation, or other programs likely to reduce your energy bills from CLP.

These conditions are applicable to all residential members.

Before disconnecting electric service between October 1 and April 30, CLP must provide:

• A 30-day notice of disconnection

- A statement of members' rights and responsibilities
- A list of local energy assistance providers
- Cold Weather Rule protection form
- Payment arrangement form

If you have any concerns about paying your electric bill this winter, please contact us at (218) 834-2226 or (800) 580-5881 before the due date. If you receive a disconnect notice, fill out the Cold Weather Rule pamphlet and the payment arrangement form included. Please have the forms returned back to CLP prior to the disconnect date.

Fudge Nut Bars

Crust:

1 cup butter

2 cups brown sugar (packed)

2 eggs

1 tsp vanilla

2 ½ cups flour

1 tsp soda

1 tsp salt

3 cups oatmeal

Filling:

1 12oz pkg chocolate chips

1 can Eagle brand milk

2 Tbsp butter

½ tsp salt

2 tsp vanilla

1 cup walnuts (chopped)

Mix and pat 2/3 of ingredients for crust into a 9x13 pan. Melt together filling ingredients, omitting the vanilla and walnuts until the very end then and add in. Crumble the remaining crust on top. Bake at 350 degrees for 25-30 minutes or until golden brown. You may also bake in a 10×15 pan for a thinner bar.

The Board discussed redistricting and will ask our members to see if they support changing district boundaries.

A motion was made and seconded to go to Executive Session to discuss GRE information.

Next Board meeting date is July 26, 2023, at 9:00 a.m.
